Indoor Snowman/Snowwoman



Directions:

- 1. Tape wax paper to work area.
- 2. Push tooth pick halfway into one ball, then push the tooth pick into another ball to hold the two together. If you are using 3 balls, do the same step for holding the third ball.
- 3. Have an adult cut the bottom off the bottom ball so the snowman will stand up.
- 4. Push twigs into ball for arms.

Here is what you need...)

- 2 or 3 (2-1/2 to 3 inch) styrofoam balls
- tooth picks
- 2 small twigs
- table knife
- 2 buttons
- waxed paper
- soap flakes
- tape
- measuring cups



Recipe for "snow"

1-1/4 cups soap flakes (i.e. lvory Snow)3/4 cup waterCombine soap flakes and water.

Have an adult help you beat this mixture with an electric beater on high until fluffy.

If it begins to harden as you are working, stir in a few drops of water. Makes 1-3/4 cups.

5. Spread "snow" on the balls with a table knife.

6. Press buttons into wet snow for eyes. Let snowman dry. Awesome!

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Answers to Eye Spy

The key is located in the branches of the tree in upper left, you will find the match in the fence by the house that is the second from the right, letter "A" can be found in the window in the second house from the left, where is the coin? under the squirrel tree, the book looks like a rug under the door of the second house from the right, the lollipop is hidden in the rock walk by the first house on the right, the tire is around the squirrel hole, the letter "K" is one of the branches in the squirrel tree, you will find the needle hanging with the icicles on the first house on the right, and the **popcorn** is in the snow bank behind the pond near the squirrel tree.
